This presents a simple apologetic of Christianity, which sometimes is more effective than complex and intellectual arguments. That doesn't mean the contents are wrong, but just detailed enough to show philosophy, science, history, and the finality of death all legitimately point to God.

Unfortunately, the author compromises with Deep Time philosophy and Evolutionism, dismissing them as compatible with Christianity and so irrelevant. Nothing could be further from the truth as these are a great stumbling block to evangelism.
