Things Are Bad and Will Only Worsen

Written at the turn of the century, this catalogues the shocking decline in civilisation since the early 20thC, particularly from the sexual revolution of the 1960s.

30% of child abusers were abused themselves.

When a mother remarries, father-contact reduces; some men don't even try.

Divorce is associated with lower discipline, play, physical care, and emotional development.

~80% of divorcees remarry.

V) <u>Violence (pp. 98-125)</u>

7% of youths commit 80% of violent offenses.

Deindividualisation and *group polarisation* are powerful psychological effects for committing crime when youths congregate

VI) Money and Misery (pp. 126-160)

Students behave more selfishly after taking economics courses.

A rising tide won't life sunken boats!

A man who can barely support himself will not look to taking a wife and having children.

After 3-4 months, 75% of babies sleep through the night allowing the

parents more rest.

The family wage has been eroded so that a labouring young man can no longer afford a family.

VII) Individualism and Community (pp. 161-194)

Americans, followed by Australians, are the most individualistic.

Choices are fewer under collectivism.

"Depression is a creature of maximal self."

The freedom of divorce adds to the other spouse's insecurity.

Divorce rates peak after four years.

"Love makes the time pass and time makes love pass."

VIII) Media, Minds, and the Public Good (pp. 195-234)

By the end of elementary school, the average child has seen 8,000 TV murders and 100,000 violent acts!

Viewing violence desensitises one to cruelty.

Children under 8 have trouble discerning commercials from reality.
